SUPREME AWARDS AND ART EXPO

6-10 OCTOBER 2021

It was wonderful that we were able to proceed with the Supreme Awards and Art Expo 2021, given all the cancellations of events that have been 'forced' because of COVID restrictions. This is the Society's most prestigious exhibition with the judged category of Supreme Award open to all entering artists. It was heartwarming to see the participation of 80 Artists (I believe an all-time record) a lot of effort had been put in by many.

The Exhibition team adopted the attitude that we would carry on preparations as if we were



going ahead, until we couldn't. We 'dodged a few bullets' and quietly kept our fingers crossed. It was such a thrill to see it all come together.

Set up day went well with 65 members, family, and other helpers pitching in to make it a smooth operation. The check in process went well with 3 receiving tables. The display screens and lights were arranged with alcoves and viewing spaces rather than rows, and appeared spacious and impressive. Thanks to morning tea bakers and Greg Nicie for the great BBQ to boost the helpers' energy.

GALA OPENING

In keeping with the COVID restrictions we limited the numbers at the Gala Opening and encouraged all to sign in, wear masks and practice social distancing. It was an excellent event. 80 members had entered artworks in the Expo totalling 369 artworks! Thank you to all entrants for your enthusiasm and courage to enter. Many entrants entered artwork in a public exhibition for the first time.

Debbie Clarke welcomed guests and artists, and guest artists - the Okorore Group with their varied crafts and artforms, and thanked the sponsors. The Supreme Awards were kindly sponsored by the Jensen Family for the first time, this announcement was met with a resounding round of applause. Our grateful appreciation to Anne Jensen and her family for their generous support.

This year, the Supreme Award entries were required to interpret a theme for the first time. The theme for 2021 was "My New Zealand". Each artwork was presented with a 'precis' about the painting written by the artist. Local artist Graham Crow judged the 44 entries to the Supreme Award during the afternoon. Jolene James – announcer from The Breeze radio station and Chair of Tauranga Creative Communities - announced the Supreme Award winners.

Graham Crow made comments on the attributes of each artwork as the awards were presented which were greatly appreciated. After the Awards presentation, Jolene announced the Expo 'Open' and there was a flurry of activity as art buyers secured the tags of their chosen artworks. 33 artworks were sold on opening night.

Throughout the four-day Expo we welcomed 1700 visitors. 107 paintings were sold. Just one painting short of our all-time record set in October 2020 however the overall value of art sold set a new record. Sold artworks were marked with a red dot and purchasers came to collect them between 4 and 5pm on our final day.

FLORISTS: Three local florists - Blanc, Bethlehem Floral Studio and Seed and Bow provided superb floral displays to enhance the exhibition – see photos of their works of art below. Our grateful thanks for their support. Please support them in their business when you next order flowers.







CARDS AND PRINTS:

13 Artists were involved in selling their cards. John Campbell and Betty Oakes did a great job of staffing the cards stands and coordinating with artists, and sold over \$2000 of cards.

LIVE ART:

There were 7 artists participating with live art. At one point there were 5 artists painting, jelly printing, drawing etc at once. This provided huge interest to visitors. Thank you to those who put themselves out there with this.

PEOPLE'S CHOICE AWARD:

Gordon Harris Art Supplies sponsored this coveted award with a \$300 voucher for winner and \$200 voucher for runner up. Over 800 votes were received and collated. Each vote added another email address to our database to send out invitations to future exhibitions. Special thanks to Nancy Frazer who donated a painting as the lucky draw prize for all who voted for their favourite painting. The recipient was delighted.

END-OF-YEAR COMPETITIONS

The end of the year competitions will be held on Saturday 27th November.

We encourage you to enter an art work / painting in this event. Below are the categories for the competition:

- 1. Marie Peters Millennium Cup: Best Pastel
- 2. Grace Walsh Trophy: Best Oil
- 3. Georgia Don Memorial Cup: Best Acrylic
- 4. Marge Martin Salver: Tauranga Scene
- 5. Caster Brothers Award: Best Watercolour (Tube, cake or pencil)
- 6. Cam Burgoyne Thomas Memorial Award & Keith Corner Memorial Trophy: Best Abstract (Does not depict a person, place or thing in the natural world)
- 7. Jensen Trophy: Best Coloured Pencil (no washes)
- 8. Contemporary Art Trophy: Best Contemporary Art (art of today/reflecting modern day life)
- 9. Reg Chalmers Memorial Cup: President's Choice "My New Zealand" theme
- 10. President's Trophy: Best Emerging Artist "My New Zealand" theme

(Up to 2 years as an artist not just 2 years at TSA, OR an artist who has not won an Award or a Merit at TSA Club competitions previously)

Please bring your paintings to the Elizabeth Street Community Centre <u>between 9:00 & 9:30 am on Saturday 27th November.</u>

Remember to cover your name on the front of your work and have a swinging tag attached to the back, stating your name, the title of your work and the category your art is to be entered. Also write your name on the back of the painting in case the swing tag comes off.

COMPETITION RULES:

- 1. All entries to have been completed within the 12 months prior to the competition.
- 2. Entries must be entirely the member's own work and not done in a class of instruction, or copied from publications or photographs taken by other people without their written permission.
- 3. Entries must be presented in a finished, dry condition, framed or otherwise finished, ready for hanging. This requires "D" rings and cord, or finished in a stable mount with a rigid backing able to be supported and hung.
- 4. Airbrushed works of art will be accepted as airbrushed in its medium category. If a painting is part airbrushed and part painting it must be labelled as Mixed Media/ Airbrush in its medium category.
- 5. All entries must have the name of the member, and the category/ competition being entered, on a swinging tag long enough to hang over the top and hang in front of the painting, securely attached at the back. The member's signature to be covered on the front.
- 6. **One entry per person category** will be accepted, unless stated by the competition coordinator.
- 7. Members can enter in absentia if another member presents and collects their work.
- 8. All competing members must be financial.
- 9. The committee reserves the right to reject any entry that does not meet the above criteria.
- 10. All entries will be displayed on the Society's Exhibition Screens No easels are used.
- 11. All entries are to remain on display until 12:30pm. Artists may collect their paintings after 12:30pm.

PROGRAMME AND COMPETITIONS SUB-COMMITTEE

Critique Session:

Bruce Hutchinson will be the appraiser for the Critique Session to be held at the club rooms on the 2nd November at 1.00 pm. Due to lockdown cancelling the previous event, we look forward to Bruce bringing some insightful knowledge for us as artists to improve our techniques. Bring your paintings along to get some expert advice on all artistic areas to improve your work. Past sessions have been very informative and enjoyable, Bruce is sure not to disappoint. Not to be missed!

Please note these points for the end-of-year competitions that seem to get overlooked:

Due to a discussion at the Executive meeting, **hanging artwork** can be done without using a frame, as long as it can be displayed onto the screen safely. This may include a skirt hanger if needed but artists will be responsible for their own work should anything untoward happen. This is to make the competitions accessible for those who haven't framed their art yet.

D Rings must be used and not stick out screws/loops.

The string should not be too long nor too short, it needs to hang over the front of the art and then be able to be tucked behind without hanging down below the artwork.

Please write your name on the back of the artwork in case the tag comes off and cover your name on the front of the artwork before judging.

Note that entries must be entirely the member's own work and not done in a class of instruction or copied from publications or photographs taken by other people without their written permission. **Free images/photos** downloaded from Pixabay.com can be used without any copyright infringement and do not need to be acknowledged should you use these as your art reference.

Abiding by these requirements makes the entry of the art much easier for the Programme and Competition team. Many thanks for your help in these matters.

Members, don't forget to **bring a plate** for the lunch afterwards as this will be our final day unless some sessions decide to continue into December. Ask your session leaders if this is something that is available for you on your chosen day.

LIBRARY NEWS

Hi everyone,

The Expo was a roaring success showcasing so many talented artists and the diversity of art in New Zealand. Continuing on with my around-the-world series of different sorts of art:

Russian Decoupage

Anne Jensen in the Tuesday class showed us a beautiful hat box with decoupage known in Russia as Zhostovo. It was a gorgeous lacquered maroon colour with flowers on top. This is an ancient craft from the late 18th century where mainly trays were made of paper-mache or tin and covered with a ground and then painted. Sometimes bronze or aluminium dust was used underneath which shone through the crackle glaze and then sealed with varnish. Anne won first prize for this in a competition.

African Art

In this huge continent, Sub-Saharan African art has many forms and practices often based on significant religious symbolism and also can be political, ideological or purely for entertainment. Wooden sculpture depicting figurines or gods and paintings, pottery and rock art are often created for spiritual reasons. Many famous artists have been inspired by African art for its colourful symbolism and tribal diversity.

India

Indian folk art and tribal art abound in this large country. Three of the most popular are; <u>Madhubani</u> - characterised by geometric patterns which mirror the work of Picasso and Miro. Most depict Gods, flora and fauna.

<u>Warli</u> - triangles and circles and squares depict daily life such as hunting, fishing, festivals and dance.

Ghond - bold vibrant coloured paintings with charcoal, cow dung, leaves and soil.

The library is being well utilised lately. During the Christmas break you may take out books for **two months**, otherwise please remember to return books after one month.

Review of three books:

The Yin/Yang of Painting – by Hongnian Zhang & Lois Woolley (Oil 10)
Reveals the secrets of painting found in ancient Chinese philosophy. The paintings are all soft muted colours and each section gives tips on use of warm and cool colours, and colours to create mood. It also demonstrates using different intensity of colour and complimentary hues. I found this book very interesting on the application of oils.

<u>Italian Contemporary Art</u> – by Claudio Ghilardi & Vanni Melani (Abstract 6) Italian art always brings to mind soft vistas of Tuscany and colours of Venice. This book reminds us that art is expressed in a variety of different ways and imagination by artists all over the world. The abstract paintings showcase contemporary art and expressionism of Italian subjects in many different forms.

Faces of Fiji – by Kristin Zambucka

(Pastel 32)

Subtle pastels capture the beauty of Fijian and Fijian-Indian faces. On page 20 a particular work of a Hindu holy man shows the years of hard toil etched upon his face. The portraits are realistic and have captured the expressions well.
