END-OF-YEAR COMPETITIONS

Saturday 3rd December at Elizabeth St Community Hall (across the road from the Art Room) Judge will be Angela Maritz.

Simply choose which categories you want to enter and then check your artworks in at the Hall from 8.30am to 9.15am on the day. The 10 categories are listed below with criteria where necessary. You are encouraged to enter as many categories as you can.

PLEASE MAKE SURE:

 You label each artwork with a Swing Tag that is attached with string that allows it to be hung over the front of the artwork. On the Swing Tag list:

Your name;

The category – both the number and name of the category (e.g. 4. Marge Martin Salver: Tauranga Scene):

Title of artwork.

- Cover your signature on the front of the artwork with a removable tape or sticker.
- Write your name on the back of your artwork with a sticker or tape.
- Your artwork must be fitted with sturdy (nylon) cord at the back so it can be hung on display screens.

Each category is awarded a winner's Trophy and Certificate, as well as two Merit Awards. Each artwork will be judged on:

- WOW factor Originality / Creativity
- Composition
- Skill with Medium
- Skill with Colour
- Unity / Presentation

Here is how the day is going to run:

Early: Competitions team organise placing of screens and seating etc. If you are not helping

set up you will be asked to wait. Please be patient as things can get busy, and you

may be asked to actively participate in setting up.

8.30 - 9.15am: Artists bring artworks to the hall - unwrap artwork – check in artwork.

9.15am: Judging begins.

9.15 - 10am: Tea and coffee and a chat available at the Art Room.

10.00 - 10.30am: Presentation by Yana Meech, who recently was our guest Appraiser (amazing!) Yana

lives in rural Katikati and is a self-taught artist preferring to work in acrylics and inks

on framed canvas. Her style ranges from contemporary landscape to abstract.

10.30 - 11.00am: Art materials sale at Art Room (bring some cash).

11am (approx): Prize-giving at the Community Hall.

12.00 - 12.30pm: Viewing of art. Artworks can be collected at 12.30pm.

12.30pm: Lunch at Art Room (bring a plate of finger food to share for lunch).

Parking: We have permission to park at the **Art and Craft Centre, 177 Elizabeth St** on Sat 3rd Dec. (If you park at the Legion of Frontiersmen, 165 Elizabeth St, there's a high chance of getting a ticket.)

Note: Please refrain from wearing perfume/fragrances so that people with sensitivities can attend.

- 7. Jensen Trophy: Best Coloured Pencil (no washes)
- 8. Contemporary Art Trophy: Best Contemporary Art (art of today/reflecting modern day life) (any medium)
- 9. Reg Chalmers Memorial Cup: President's Choice "Blowing in the Wind" theme (any medium)
- 10. President's Trophy: Best Emerging Artist "Open" theme (any medium) (Up to 2 years as an artist not just 2 years at TSA, OR an artist who has not won an Award or a Merit at TSA Club competitions previously)

COMPETITION RULES:

- 1. All entries to have been completed within the 12 months prior to the competition.
- 2. Entries must be entirely the member's own work and not done in a class of instruction, or copied from publications or photographs taken by other people without their written permission.
- 3. Entries must be presented in a finished, dry condition, framed or otherwise finished, ready for

hanging. This requires "D" rings and cord, or finished in a stable mount with a rigid backing - able to be supported and hung. NOTE: Unframed artworks CAN be entered but artist must provide a means to hang art (securely) on screen for display; e.g., coat hanger, bulldog clips or similar, check at door.

- 4. Airbrushed works of art will be accepted as airbrushed in its medium category. If a painting is part airbrushed and part painting it must be labelled as Mixed Media/ Airbrush in its medium category.
- 5. All entries must have the name of the member, the category number and the category/ competition being entered, on a swinging tag long enough to hang over the top and hang in front of the painting, securely attached at the back. The member's signature to be covered on the front.
- 6. One entry per person category will be accepted, unless stated by the competition coordinator.
- 7. Members can enter in absentia if another member presents and collects their work.
- 8. All competing members must be financial by 26 November 2022.
- 9. The committee reserves the right to reject any entry that does not meet the above criteria.
- 10. All entries will be displayed on the Society's Exhibition Screens No easels are used.
- 11. All entries are to remain on display until 12:30pm. Artists may collect their paintings after 12:30pm.

The Garden & Art Festival saw a record number of 61 members of our Society participate at the Tauranga Racecourse from Thursday 17th November until Sunday 20th at the Bloom in the Bay hub. It was a magnificent display of 413 paintings including tiny art and while sales weren't as many as last time, everyone had a great time in getting to know each other better. Several artists were able to work in their chosen mediums during live art displays for the visitors to see, gaining valuable exposure and interaction with the public.

As a Society, we were very fortunate to have a downstairs area that all visitors had to pass through to gain entry to the outside displays. Comments were made as to the arrangement of the screens and how pleasing it was to the eye. Thank you to Paul Clarke and helpers for organising a plan for us to follow.

Artists could enter up to five paintings plus four tiny art and all paintings ended up being exhibited as some sold and were replaced. 















PROGRAMME AND COMPETITIONS SUB-COMMITTEE

Shona Mackenzie - Gel Print and Mixed Media class

Starting on the 2nd of February next year Shona Mackenzie will be taking a Gel Print and Mixed Media class on Thursday afternoons. Gel printing is a fast, fun, easy and addictive way to bring layers and vibrancy into your work. The class will start off with a demo session showing how to make your own gel plate, options around materials and introducing you to her process. The next few sessions will be spent learning and exploring two to three new techniques each week. These sessions will help you build a body of work, either to frame or to use in mixed media pieces.

Following the gel printing, Shona will teach you to create your own concertina sketch book. Gel prints will form the foundation of your mixed media exploration in these versatile accordion style books. You'll get lots of tips and tricks from Shona along the way. Finally, all your learning will culminate in creating a finished mixed media work, full of vibrant colours and rich layers.

The course will cost \$15 a session and you'll bring your own materials. If there are only some parts of the course you wish to attend feel free to send Shona an email at shonamackenzieart@gmail.com. ROBIN PURLLANT DRAWING WORKSHOP - PART 1 (Saturday 5th November and Sunday 6th November 2022)

Nine of us attended the first two-day workshop held by our esteemed fellow artist Robin Purllant. Robin had us practicing our pencil control techniques for most of the first day as this is always an important part of "warm up" (a bit like doing your scales on a piano!). He also stated that every artist should do at least 20 minutes of sketching per day as this gives a better appreciation for observation, perspective, detail, and tonal differences which can then be applied to either drawing or painting.

On the second day, we had to draw a polystyrene ball in detail including shading and light. Harder than you would think! Polystyrene holds the light differently and absorbs light in places. We also had to draw "perfect circles" and were shown a couple of clever techniques to do this, as well as drawing and shading a ball with our opposite hand than usual. That was really hard too but the aim was that it would sharpen our observation and thinking processes about our artwork and really focus on where the light truly was.

We had an enjoyable two days and a lot of laughs together. Robin also showed us some of his "unseen works" that had particular special meaning to him and shared some of his wonderful memories of his time at Art School (London). Our homework is to draw in detail pinecones, and he will critique

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our work individually when we come back for part 2 (26th and 27th November 2022). We are all looking forward to this.

EVAN WOODRUFFE WORKSHOP (Saturday 29th October 2022)

Evan is a well-known artist, who is employed by Gordon Harris for the purpose of engaging with the makers of art supplies globally as well as promoting new products to the art world. He has met frequently with the makers of Winsor and Newton, Schmincke and Golden brands.

We were most impressed to learn he even has a range of paintbrushes named after him (called the "Evan Woodruffe brush collection"). We had an enjoyable day trialling liquid charcoal (Schmincke), "so flat acrylics" (Golden), "Aqua drops, and granulating Aqua drops" liquid watercolours (Schmincke). We trialled hemp paper (which is super strong), bamboo paper and agave paper. Hemp will be a good seller; we all enjoyed the strength of this - 80grams held watercolour really well.

The main focus was that where you place the colours is the most important part of leading the eye around the painting to where you want it to follow and that the brightest colours only need a small spot to start this process of viewing a painting.



His favourite canvases are Gordon Harris Expression (in the smaller sizes) and "Stretched With Love" as these are top-quality professional canvases.

LIBRARY NEWS

Hi Everyone,

NZ Artist - Peter McIntyre (04-07-1910 to 11-09-1995)

I recently read Peter McIntyre's autobiography. A very interesting read, it spans from his childhood in Dunedin through WWII and his later years. His father was an artist, Peter McIntyre Senior, and encouraged a young Peter at the age of twenty to attend the London Slade School of Art from 1931 to 1934. He studied there for four years mixing with bohemian types and other London-ites. He painted commissioned portraits to make money.

In 1939 he enlisted in the British army and then joined the NZ army division as a gunner in the 34th Anti-tank Battery and was appointed to the position of war artist. His paintings and sketches give an

impression of the drama, colour, humour and tragedy of war. He describes trying to sketch and paint in the dust and heat of the desert in Egypt, in the mud and snow of Crete and Cassino in Italy as the convoy moved, and from an aeroplane. His sketches capture compelling scenes of war in a way that no photograph could and his gripping war paintings were printed in the Illustrated London News and the NZ press which portrayed the dramatic reality of war.

After a fifteen-year absence he returned to NZ to begin life anew, and settled in Wellington with his wife and built his own house. He returned to Europe, Hong Kong and the Pacific and painted many canvases of life in these areas as well as his beloved NZ. He had dreamed of going to Antarctica to paint, another very challenging scenario. His first lesson at the Slade was to paint a white egg on a white background and this stood him in good stead for the sheer whiteness of Antarctica with its soaring ridges and icebergs, the translucent blues and greens trapped within the ice and the extreme blue of the sky.

He had many exhibitions and was awarded an OBE. He painted a king, a pope, six generals and a thousand beautiful women and hundreds of scenic landscapes. He published five books and had a documentary made about him. He also lectured extensively in NZ and wrote numerous newspaper articles.




GRAHAM BAKER WORKSHOP

PORTRAITURE

"In drawing, one must look for or suspect that there is more than casually seen" George Bridgman

It has certainly been a very busy time for us all with Garden & Art Festival disrupting our normal "Portraiture" schedule. There is very little for me to report because our second session of the month had to be cancelled because it was set up day at the race course. Even our first session for November was attended by only 5 members. I think a Christmas break this year is going to be more than welcome!

Instead of writing about Portraiture this month, I am going to focus on my experience at Garden & Art Festival. I exhibited in a garden close to the Hub venue and also at our own exhibition. For me both venues were very successful. My garden, "Expressive Gardens" was located close to the "Hub" in Nature Place and my hosts Bobbie and Morton Anderson were extremely helpful throughout the four rain effected days. I sold many cards, but there were three highlights that made Garden Art so rewarding for me.

Firstly, I sold my "ANZAC Memorial" piece to the Greerton RSA. This was the highlight for me because I had purposely designed and painted this memorial piece to be exhibited in such a public environment. They have invited me to present my artwork to their members which I am looking forward to.

Secondly, a gentlemen approached me and we began a long conversation regarding my work and I mentioned that I had based one of them on the English village where I had lived and grew up (Hertford Heath). He could not have been more surprised because he had also lived in the village and taught at the public school (Haileybury College) which was located nearby. My father also worked as a carpenter at the college and he made the painting pallet I now use from the wood of a 500-year oak tree that stood in the college grounds and was badly damaged by a lightning strike.

Thirdly, the lady that purchased my winning entry for the Supreme Award came to see me at the garden and I was able to explain to her in detail the meaning of "Tempus Fugit". She has invited me to her house to view where it is now hung. Viewing this painting in situ after two and half years work really does complete the circle, from its creative beginnings right through to the finished work on display.



All these anecdotes add an extra dimension to my paintings and reinforces the opening sentence of my Bio which states "All my paintings tell stories...".

"ANZAC" Memorial". The imagery for this is based on stories my grandfather told me about his experiences during the First World War. He was only 18 when badly injured during the Battle of the Somme. His remembrances included the barbed wire which they encountered all the time and the heavily bloodied and muddy bandages while waiting to be transferred away from the front line to a French hospital. Both these are featured in the lower half of the memorial. The portrait at the top is an image of an ANZAC killed at Gallipoli. I have painted his image morphing into a three-dimensional red poppy. The brightly coloured cross bar is made of ribbons from New Zealand war medals. The poem is by the war poet Wilfred Owen, the lettering of which is etched out of brass. The inspiration for the design of the surround is taken from the war memorial of my home village Hertford Heath. I have created the New Zealand flag in a unique way by painting two versions and then weaving them together to form a single image. The result is a fractured looking flag that emphasises the destruction and insanity of war.
